The accreditation period for VCE Extended Investigation has been extended and expires 31 December 2024.

Critical Thinking Test – August

Test specifications

Overall conditions

The test will be sat at a time and date to be set annually by the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA). VCAA examination rules will apply.

The Critical Thinking Test for VCE Extended Investigation will be undertaken on a computer.

There will be 15 minutes of reading time and 1 hour and 15 minutes of writing time.

The test will be assessed by a panel appointed by the VCAA.

The test will contribute 10 per cent to the study score.

Content

The VCE Extended Investigation Study Design 2019–2024 is the document for the development of the test. Questions will be based on the key knowledge and key skills that underpin the outcomes in Unit 3.

Format

The test will be undertaken on a computer.

The test will consist of a range of objectively scored questions, including matching exercises, short-answer questions and extended-answer questions.

All questions will be compulsory. The total marks for the test will be 40.

Advice

During the 2019–2024 accreditation period for VCE Extended Investigation, the Critical Thinking Test will be prepared according to the test specifications above. Each test will conform to these specifications.

Students should use command/task words, other instructional information within questions and corresponding mark allocations to guide their responses.

A separate document containing sample questions has been published on the VCE Extended Investigation 'Examination specifications, past examinations and examination reports' page on the VCAA website.

The sample questions provide an indication of the types of questions teachers and students can expect until the current accreditation period is over.

The VCAA does not provide answers to sample questions.
