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VCE Leadership Awards 2019 nominees announced

The VCE Leadership Awards 2019 nominees have been announced, with four of the six students hailing from regional and rural Victorian schools.

A panel of seven judges from both the VCAA and the Foundation for Young Australians chose the nominees for the VCE Leader of the Year from a field of over 30 applicants. The nominees come from as far afield as Terang, Cobram, Traralgon and Ballarat, as well as from metropolitan schools.

This year's ceremony will take place at Queen's Hall at Parliament House on Wednesday 18 September, with Chris Wardlaw, VCAA Chair, present at the proceedings. Our sponsor, Lenovo, will again provide the prizes for the leaders.

The awards recognise the outstanding contributions of VCE students to their schools and communities. To be eligible for the awards, nominees must have demonstrated initiative, inspired others, be able to work well in a team, and be committed to making a difference.

This year's candidates are drawn from varied school sectors, are highly active within their schools and are dedicated to making a difference in a wide range of social causes. The nominees are:

- Lachlan Warwick from Ballarat Grammar, who has developed a program to support victims of family violence within his community
- Maya Ghassali from Gleneagles Secondary College, who has established a podcast highlighting stories of asylum seekers from a broad range of backgrounds
- Ellie Jones from Cobram Secondary College, who has been instrumental in raising funds for several projects in her rural community, such as restoring the local cinema gutted by fire
- Lincoln Ingravalle from Lavalla Catholic College, who has performed as Latrobe City Council Youth Mayor, promoting positive mental health and child protection in his community of Traralgon
- Sophie-Kate Shaw from Terang P–12 College, who has organised fundraising activities to support drought-stricken farmers in south-west Victoria
- Maiysha Moin from Fintona Girls' School, who was the organiser and media spokesperson for the Melbourne School Strike 4 Climate in March, and is the co-founder of Climate Leaders.

Maiysha said that it was an honour to receive her nomination. 'I am very humbled to be selected as one of the six Leaders of 2019,' she said. Lincoln echoed this sentiment, expressing his thanks and gratitude to the VCAA. 'I am truly quite humbled,' he said.

The 2018 VCE Leader of the Year award was presented to Victoria Hirt from Melton Christian College. Victoria's leadership helped to channel resources and skilled volunteers in Cambodian communities to improve the lives of some of that country's most vulnerable people – women, girls and prisoners.

The VCAA wishes all the 2019 VCE Leaders the best of luck. We thank the schools and students who took the time to submit applications for this year's awards, and Lenovo, for its ongoing support.

New videos: Exploring the Swedish context of engagement in early childhood education and care

Professor Susanne Garvis, an Australian researcher at the University of Gothenburg, and guest professor at Stockholm University, was featured in the recent VCAA's Early Years Twilight Seminar at the Bastow Institute of Educational Leadership.

Professor Garvis spoke with Darlene Leach, Manager of the Early Learning Unit at the Department of Education and Training, about the *Swedish Curriculum for Preschools* (2016), and explored its similarities with the Victorian Early Years Learning and Development Framework (VEYLDF).

The conversation ranged from the concepts of *inskolning* (transitions), *diskutera* (professional discussions) and 'equivalence', to the role of families, in partnership with early childhood educators, in the Swedish preschool curriculum.

Understanding equity and diversity in Victorian communities

The [State of Victoria's Children Report 2017](#) was published by the Department of Education and Training in August 2019. The report focuses on the health and wellbeing of children, bringing together current research and recent data to provide a comprehensive picture of how Victorian children are faring.

This year's report illustrates that most children and young people in Victoria are healthy and happy, and have adequate support to help them to thrive. However, family pressures, socio-economic disadvantage and an accumulation of risk factors can lead to a compounding effect on health and wellbeing outcomes. The report also includes an accessible infographics summary.

The VEYLDF includes the practice principle 'equity and diversity'. Early childhood educators and teachers can gain an understanding, through this report, of the challenges and opportunities faced by children in the Victorian context. This population-level data shows the diversity of the Victorian communities, and can inform how early childhood educators engage with their communities.

National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)

Professional development workshops for the reporting of NAPLAN 2019

A series of professional development workshops for principals, NAPLAN coordinators and teachers will be conducted throughout Term 4. The workshops will focus on the NAPLAN Online results and reporting, and will target schools that completed the NAPLAN tests online in 2019. The workshops will cover an overview of the online branched testing model, access and interpretation of the four reports in the newly developed VCAA Data Service and the reports contained in the Sessional Staff Management System. Reference will also be made to the reports on group and school-wide outcomes and relative growth provided through the NAPLAN Data Service. These workshops are conducted free of charge at various locations around metropolitan and regional Victoria. Details of times and locations for these workshops, and information on how to register for them, will be available on the VCAA website by the beginning of Term 4.

A video outlining the reports in the NAPLAN Data Service and how to interpret them will also be available on the VCAA website. It will be a refresher for those who have used this service in the past and as an overview for those who are new to it.

NAPLAN Writing test markers required for 2020

The VCAA is seeking applications from current and retired teachers to mark the NAPLAN 2020 Writing test.

NAPLAN Writing test markers gain rich and rewarding experience from reading and assessing a range of student writing from Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Markers who complete the training sessions and mark satisfactorily gain recognition from the Victorian Institute of Teaching for professional practice.

NAPLAN Writing test markers have the option of working at home or from the VCAA Coburg Assessment Centre. All marking is done on computer, using a specific platform.

New markers are appointed on the basis of teaching and other relevant experience. Experienced markers are reappointed each year on the basis of marking accuracy and time commitment to the NAPLAN marking project.

Applicants may apply for day or evening shifts, although current full-time teachers are expected to apply only for the evening shift.

All markers are required to attend two full-day training sessions. New markers must also attend an additional introductory training day. Training attendees are paid CRT rates for training days. Dates for training sessions are yet to be finalised.

Marking the NAPLAN Writing test takes around 27 days and includes weekend work. Day markers are required to commit to an average of at least four hours marking each day over the time of the project. Evening markers commit to an average marking time of at least three hours per day.

Applications via the Sessional Staff Management System will open in October 2019 and close in early February 2020, or earlier if the required number of suitable applicants have been selected.

VCE English and English as an Additional Language and VCE Literature text advisory panels applications

Applications are sought from suitably qualified persons for membership of the text advisory panels for VCE English and English as an Additional Language and VCE Literature for the 2022 text lists.

Applications can be lodged through the VCAA [Sessional Staff Management System](#), which accepts and processes applications for sessional work. The closing date for applications is Friday 18 October 2019.

VCE English and English as an Additional Language and VCE Literature text advisory panels advise the VCAA on appropriate texts for inclusion in prescribed text lists. Text advisory panels typically consist of between five and 12 members and meet regularly during the year. Panel meetings will be held within the vicinity of the VCAA office at 2 Lonsdale Street, Melbourne.

Panel members will be appointed from schools, universities, training organisations and other sectors, where appropriate. Panel members are appointed according to their expertise, experience and capacity to contribute to the text selection process.

Members of the panels must ensure they are familiar with the details of the relevant accredited study designs and, in particular, with the role of texts within them.

Photograph 51 is a play set for study for VCE English and English as an Additional Language (EAL) on List 2. The VCE English and English as an Additional Language (EAL) Text List indicates this text was published in 2015. However, the text has been subsequently revised and was reprinted in 2018. The ISBN number was not altered but there are some changes to the text of the play.

For this current teaching year (2019), both editions are acceptable for study, and teachers and students should be assured that all external assessment of this text will be considered in light of both editions.

However, from 2020, the 2018 revised edition of *Photograph 51* will be the set text for study for VCE English and English as an Additional Language (EAL). The VCE English and English as an Additional Language (EAL) Text List 2020 will be updated to reflect this change.

Transport and logistics industry VET courses for secondary students

Schools are invited to contribute to the design and structure of a VCE VET Transport and Logistics Industry program. The program will:

VCE VET Scored Assessment Reform project

The VCAA has undertaken a review of VCE VET Scored Assessment, which is the first significant review since the inception of the program. The review has been comprehensive, including:

- seeking feedback through a series of workshops
- undertaking a deep analysis of the feedback to identify the components of scored assessment that are working well and components that are not working well
- identifying components for improvement
- integrating the improved components into redesigned VCE VET Scored Assessment Task Types
- testing of the new task types by a pilot group in a range of VCE VET programs in 2019.

Major review of VCE VET Equine Studies Program

The Certificate II Equine Studies has been subject to a major review and the course has been reaccredited as Certificate III in Equine Studies 22513VIC. Units were reviewed and re-written to better reflect current and emerging industry requirements. The new course structure is more flexible and offers greater elective choice and vocational streams. Core units have been reduced from 10 to eight, and elective units increased from two to three.

The course development process took into consideration the findings of the 2015 ASQA Strategic Review of Training in equine programs in Australia, which include the requirement for registered training organisations to ensure that there is a strong and consistent focus on safety in riding and handling and an understanding of horse behaviour. In order to address these issues, and to be consistent with RGR and AHC training package courses the units, ACMEQU202 Handle Horses (100 hours) and ACMEQU205 Apply Knowledge of Horse Behaviour (60 hours) are included as core units. As a result, the new course Certificate III in Equine Studies 22513VIC is considerably larger than the old Certificate II Equine Studies 22246VIC.

Continuing students in 2020 may complete 22246VIC Certificate II Equine Studies. Scored assessment for the program will continue to be drawn from the current qualification in 2020.

All students commencing training in the VCE VET Equine Studies Program from 2020 will be required to be enrolled in 22513VIC Certificate III in Equine Studies. The first year for scored assessment from this qualification will be in 2021.

Minor review of VCE VET Electrical Industry Program

The 22261VIC Certificate II in Electrotechnology Studies (Pre-vocational) expired on Sunday 30 June 2019 with no further enrolments possible after Wednesday 1 July 2020. It has been reaccredited as 22499VIC Certificate II in Electrotechnology (Pre-vocational). All students commencing training in the Victorian accredited course from Wednesday 1 January 2020 will be required to be enrolled in the new course on VASS. The old and new versions are not equivalent. Schools and registered training organisations will need to follow the transition advice for continuing students to be published by the VCAA in November 2019.

VCE VET Hospitality – Certificate II in Kitchen Operations – review of Cookery Training Package

SkillsIQ, under the direction of the Tourism, Travel and Hospitality Industry Reference Committee is undertaking a project to update the Training Package Products that relate to cookery and kitchen operations. Draft 1 of the Training Package Products is now available for feedback.

VET assessment meeting VCE or VCAL assessment requirements

Assessment for a VET Unit of Competency cannot be used to meet the requirements of a VCE or VCAL unit learning outcome. Any assessment tool developed to assess similar or related activities must be designed to meet the requirements of the individual Unit of Competency or VCE or VCAL unit. The assessment tool cannot be used to assess multiple items or units.

VET statewide workshops

The VCAA VET statewide workshops will be held during November 2019. It is very important that schools with students undertaking VET have at least one staff member attending. The workshops will cover significant information about VET reforms, including updates on VASS certificate types, revised Scored Assessment Task Types and processes, Structured Workplace Learning and School-based Apprenticeships and Traineeships Recognition, quality assessment samples and an update on the GET VET promotional material.
