SECTION 1 – Watching and responding to informal signed texts

Instructions for Section 1

- Watch Section 1 and/or read the task instructions in English that are on page 5 (opposite). You will watch an informal signed text of between 5 and 7 minutes in length. The text will be played three times with a pause of 2 minutes between each playing. **Note: You do not need to rewind the recording.** You may make notes at any time.
- Use the information provided on the recording to complete the task response in Auslan. Your response should be between 2 and 3 minutes in length.
- If you complete more than one draft, number each draft in Auslan at the start of your response. When you finish, indicate which draft you wish to have considered for marking on the A3 envelope provided.
- As a general guide, do not spend more than one hour on Section 1.

Task

You are deaf and you have a deaf relative who cannot decide whether to live in the country or in the city. Two deaf friends visit you. One friend outlines the advantages of living in the country and the other friend outlines the advantages of living in the city.

Using the information your two friends have provided, summarise the advantages of living in the country and of living in the city so you can help your relative make a decision about where to live.

Your response should be between 2 and 3 minutes in length.

- Watch Section 2 and/or read the task instructions in English that are on page 7 (opposite). You will watch a formal signed text of between 3 and 5 minutes in length. The text will be played three times with a pause of 2 minutes between each playing. **Note: You do not need to rewind the recording.** You may make notes at any time.
- Use the information provided on the recording to complete the task response in Auslan. Your response should be between 3 and 4 minutes in length.
- If you complete more than one draft, number each draft in Auslan at the start of your response. When you finish, indicate which draft you wish to have considered for marking on the A3 envelope provided.
- As a general guide, do not spend more than one hour on Section 2.

Task

As school captain, you attended an education seminar with your principal to find out about extracurricular activities for deaf students and students of Auslan. People from two organisations presented information about the extracurricular activities they deliver in schools.

Using the information the people from the two organisations provided, prepare a presentation for your student council and teachers. Explain which of the two organisations offers activities that would be of most interest to your school community.

Your response should be between 3 and 4 minutes in length.
