• Watch video/DVD 1 and/or read the task instructions in English that are on page 5 (opposite). You will watch an informal signed text approximately 5–7 minutes in length. The text will be played three times with a pause of 2 minutes between each playing. **Note: you do not need to rewind video/DVD 1.**

You may make notes at any time.

- Use the information provided on video/DVD 1 to complete the task response in Auslan. Your response should be between 2 and 3 minutes in length.
- If you complete more than one draft, number each draft in Auslan at the start of your response. When you finish, indicate which draft you wish to be considered for marking in the space provided on the labels of videos/DVDs 2 and 4 or on the A3 envelope provided.
- As a general guide, do not spend more than 1 hour on Section I.

Task

Recently, you went on a picnic where you observed two of your friends discussing climate change.

As a class representative of the school's environmental committee, you decide to make the key issues affecting global warming in Australia the topic for a class presentation.

Your response should be between 2 and 3 minutes in length.

The text will be played three times with a pause of 2 minutes between each playing. **Note: you do not need to rewind video/DVD 3.** You may make notes at any time.
- Use the information provided on video/DVD 3 to complete the task response in Auslan. Your response should be between 3 and 4 minutes in length.
- If you complete more than one draft, number each draft in Auslan at the start of your response. When you finish, indicate which draft you wish to be considered for marking in the space provided on the labels of videos/DVDs 2 and 4 or on the A3 envelope provided.
- As a general guide, do not spend more than 1 hour on Section II.
