Section I: Watching and responding to informal signed texts**Instructions for Section I**

- Watch video/DVD 1 and/or read the task instructions in English that are on page 5 (opposite). You will watch an informal signed text approximately 5–7 minutes in length. The text will be played three times with a pause of 2 minutes between each playing. **Note: You do not need to rewind video/DVD 1.** You may make notes at any time.
- Use the information provided on video/DVD 1 to complete the task response in Auslan. **Your response should be between 2 and 3 minutes in length.**
- **If you complete more than one draft, number each draft in Auslan at the start of your response. When you finish, indicate which draft you wish to be considered for marking in the space provided on the labels of videos/DVDs 2 and 4 or on the A3 envelope provided.**
- As a general guide, do not spend more than 1 hour on Section I.

Task

You observe two of your friends chatting in the park. They notice a young girl playing and begin to discuss the hopes and dreams they had when they were growing up.

Your task is to introduce an informal discussion in class entitled, 'My hopes for the future when I was younger'.

Your response should be between 2 and 3 minutes in length.

- Watch video/DVD 3 and/or read the task instructions in English that are on page 7 (opposite). You will watch a formal signed text approximately 3–5 minutes in length. The text will be played three times with a pause of 2 minutes between each playing. **Note: You do not need to rewind video/DVD 3.** You may make notes at any time.
- Use the information provided on video/DVD 3 to complete the task response in Auslan. **Your response should be between 3 and 4 minutes in length.**
- **If you complete more than one draft, number each draft in Auslan at the start of your response. When you finish, indicate which draft you wish to be considered for marking in the space provided on the labels of videos/DVDs 2 and 4 or on the A3 envelope provided.**
- As a general guide, do not spend more than 1 hour on Section II.

Task

You attend an outdoor meeting at the Deaf Club to discuss the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). During the meeting, you watch two speakers. One speaker argues that the deaf are a cultural group. The other speaker argues that the deaf are a disabled group.

Your task is to present a formal summary of the views of both speakers to a committee whose task is to administer the NDIS.

Your response should be between 3 and 4 minutes in length.
